Recommendation: Take no action as it relates to allowing backyard hens at this time based on the potential of the Avian Flu, the inability to inspect and enforce, the current By-Law staffing deficiency and the time required to complete the amendments to the Zoning and Animal Control Bylaws

Purpose: To provide members of Council with the backyard hen survey results and advise members of Council of the concerns that were identified in the survey responses as well as the responses supporting the program.

Background: At the Committee of the Whole meeting on May 27, 2024, CAO Morris presented the backyard hen report for Councils' consideration in Non-Rural Zoning areas in Smiths Falls. The report outlined some benefits of permitting backyard hens, but also some considerations for Council to consider.

Council directed staff to conduct an online public survey to gauge the level of interest of the proposed program. The online survey was posted on the Town's web site on June 10, 2024 with a closing date for submissions on June 24, 2024.

The online survey consisted of 5 questions and a comment section for the public to complete. The total number of responses to the survey was 851. There were a variety of comments, both supporting the program and not supportive of the program (Attached as Appendix A).

70% of respondents support the concept of backyard hens while 29% of respondents did not support, with 1% being undecided. 54% of respondents stated they would be interested in having chickens on their property while 45% were not interested and 1% undecided.

There were 2 major concerns contained in the comments section of the survey:

1. The Avian Flu Potential

With the current threat of a bird flu pandemic seriously affecting poultry and cattle stock in the United States.

2. Ability to Inspect and Enforce

The second concern identified the Towns ability to inspect, enforce and monitor the backyard hen program.

In consultation with our Public Health Unit, they have provided information on the safe handling of chickens and the proper hygiene practices to be followed.

Analysis and Options:

Option 1. Take no action as it relates to allowing backyard hens at this time based on the potential of the Avian Flu, the inability to inspect and enforce, the current By-Law staffing deficiency and the time required to complete the amendments to the Zoning and Animal Control Bylaws. (Recommended)

Option 2. Council directs staff to begin the process of amending the Zoning and Animal Control Bylaws and arrange the legislated public meeting to amend the Zoning Bylaw.



Comments:

Keeping chickens is one of the easiest ways to live more sustainably. They help eliminate scraps, produce a natural fertiliser, get rid of pesky garden pests, assist with composting and provide fresh eggs! Keeping chickens is one of the most rewarding ways to start living green and isn't that what the Town of Smiths Falls is all about? If Carlton place is allowed chickens, there's no reason we shouldn't be allowed.

My greatest concern is the additional need for by-law officers/ animal control. Will foul be limited to hens or will turkeys and ducks be allowed? (?) I hope landlords do not allow on rental properties

The maximum should be more than 8. It should be 12, which is a "full flock".

I don't think anyone should be allowed chickens in town and I would be very upset if my neighbours were to have chickens. Outside of that, they provide so much benefit to an area (food for community, soil, they eat scraps, tick and other pest control etc)

I've not had good experiences with current bylaw and have zero trust that they'll enforce any laws so adding some capable bylaw or training would also be great.

Number of chickens should depend on the size of the property. I have no idea about what kind of space chickens require. And there should be some sort of rule about fencing to avoid chickens roaming onto property that belongs to neighbours.

Chickens are not pets, they require care and maintenance which is expensive. Aside from the cost to keep them which includes Feed, Water, Hydro (for heat lamps in winter months = fire hazard around bedding), Proper Pens and run area. You also need to consider that rodents such as rats, racoons, squirrels, chipmunks are all attracted to chicken feed and eat eggs. Coyotes are attracted to chickens. Points on council discussion - Table scraps are not acceptable food for chickens. Please also consider, that chickens can be noisey and improperly cleaned coups can smell VERY bad. You will get complaints and there will be more problems. One additional point - this will not solve the food security issue. Instead, council should be focused promoting fresh vegetable gardens and other economic securities. Thank you for asking our opinion.

No matter how convincing the case for chickens seems, the first step should be a pilot project. Council must be prepared to side with a quiet majority over a loud or angry minority if it doesn't work out as expected.

I think yard space should be a consideration when selecting a maximum number. People complain of kids noise, gripe over inconvenience of not having access to things they want , what happens when chicken feed isn't accessible for supply or proper coop needs to be installed & safety for them applied, more griping. Chickens in town is asking for trouble on many levels that people are having tunnel vision with. It doesn't matter either what other communities are doing, reprocussions haven't been reported yet. I do hope Smiths Falls thinks this through from all angles & not on a fleeting moment. The new visual of the town has no room asthetically or from a tourist aspect. There's already complaints of wild bird poop in parks that gross people out, backyards will turn into a stenching slaughter house. Just visit any rural farm that has chickens & talk with the owner. They will tell you the behind the scene story.

Must have fenced in back yard/chicken coop.
